<u>The Stages of Pandemic</u>

As we continue to self-isolate and observe the necessities of physical distancing and disinfection of shared surfaces during the COVID-19 pandemic, I think it might be useful for us as citizens of Earth and of heaven to remember a few things.

First, this not the only instance of pandemic the world has ever faced. Examples of worldwide infection extend to and well before the Black Plague; several appearances of typhoid and typhus; the Spanish Flu following the first World War; many outbreaks of Ebola (the most recent reported in recent weeks as the second-most severe of them all), and of course, SARS. Are we still willing to pay it ..?


Over the years, Johnny served on the Board of Managers, was a member of the Kirk Session and "a jack-ofall-trades" when it came to repairs around the church property.

So far 2020 has been a very stressful year. Pandemic. People out of work. Stock market ups and downs. Racism struggles. Police brutality and the murder of George Floyd and others. Unemployment. Riots.

Many would say 2020 has been the most stressful year in their entire life.

When parents are going through tough times, children pick up on it and can become stressed out as well.

Fear can come from catching a small glimpse of the news, overhearing conversations between teens or adults and seeing what their parents post and read in social media.

It is common for kids to pick up on these things and become fearful during these crazy times.

So how can we help our children feel safe and secure during all of this? Here are some steps.

Monitor how much exposure kids have to the news. While most protests and riots have been peaceful, many have not. Media is showing images of fires, looting and violence.

Children do not have the emotional security to understand what they are seeing, and it can lead to fear, insecurity, and sadness.

Talk with children. It's important to talk with children about what they are seeing and hearing in an age appropriate way. Help them understand what is happening. If you don't, they will try to fill in the blanks themselves and may come to scary and frightening conclusions in their mind. They may even think someone is coming to get them.

As parents and leaders, we are called to walk through these times with our children and have the wisdom to help guide them through it. And during these crazy times, we must check our children's emotional temperature and help them adjust it as needed.

Be a safe place where kids can ask questions. Find out what they are thinking and reassure them that you will keep them safe. Let them know there is a great group of people that are working hard to keep everyone safe. *Relevantchildrensministry.com*

Restoring the Bell



The church Bell is a piece of history hidden high up in the steeple of Union Church. It is engraved with "Union Church, Thorburn, N.S. 1913. It had been out of commission for some time but was recently restored to working order with replacement of a pin holding the ringer. This let the bell chime out on Easter Morning despite the church being empty due to the COVID 19 pandemic. Later the bell was also rung along with others across the province in memory of lives lost in the tragic events out of Portapique.

We recently reviewed Church Records from 1913 in hopes of finding some information on the bell's origin and installation but so far could find no entries on the subject. If anyone has any history on the bell it would be great if they could share.

It is always humbling to think of all the occasions both happy and tragic that the bells chiming must have marked over the years whenever it is rung.
