


- --where people were faithful to their loving and rescuing Creator

A Look Back...Meet Finlay Dan

Finlay Dan MacDonald ran a butcher shop in Thorburn starting in the early 1900s. This time capsule photo gives us the name of his shop, F.D. McDonald Meat Market. It's another fantastic piece of Thorburn history that the younger generations may not know about.

The building of where the F.D. McDonald Meat Market was located, and the house still stands today, where else, but on the Finlay Dan Road!





Finlay Dan MacDonald and Ella Fraser were married December 24th, 1903, in Thorburn, by the Rev. J. A. MacKenzie. I like to think it was in this church, but I do not know for sure. Pictured below are Ella Fraser (b.ca 1889-1922) and Finlay Dan MacDonald (1883-1970).







It was not always an easy life, as Finlay Dan's wife Ella died in 1922. Five years later, he married Elsie May Crocket, and continued working in the meat business while raising a family. Finlay Dan MacDonald has many descendants, but anyone can go visit him at the Thorburn Cemetery, just down the road from our church. He and his wives and sons are resting there.
