
From the Minister's Desk

Have you ever stopped to consider some of the BIG Christian words we use freely in conversations and in worship? I sometimes wonder if we all understand some of these Reeves 902-922-2666 theologically-based words in fullness before we try to apply them in our lives here in the modern 21st Century.

> Of course, I mean words like redemption, justification, righteousness and salvation - and discipleship, mission, stewardship and meditation, and a bunch more that you will encounter every time you pick up the Bible or an article dealing with the human condition or morality or ethical behavior. As difficult as these words sound, sometimes we do not fully appreciate the depth of their meaning. As a result, I think we might have trouble applying them in the context of our lives.

So, to help you get started in thinking about these words and their meaning in your life, I would like to offer a little framework the Church of Scotland has developed that unfolds like

1. Think of a time when your relationship with others shaped your journey of faith.

Try to remember a time when you were taught or discovered something that changed the way you see God.

3. Is there something that Jesus said or did that you find easy to apply in your own life?

4. What about something that Jesus said or did that you find hard to apply in your life?

5. How do you notice other people following Jesus in their everyday lives?

6. Is there anything valuable from this time spent in thought about God's work in your life that causes you to spend a moment in a prayer of thanks to God?

I pray that this little exercise will prove useful as you engage in thinking about what being a Christian really is and how God wants you to deepen your knowledge of what you profess to believe.

Let us pray... Lord Jesus, you gathered some of the least likely people in your community to become your disciples and asked them to follow you. As they did, you taught them about who you are; your purpose for the world, and how they were to prepare for the time when they would be without you. Help us in our time and place to continue the good work that you began so long ago. Help us to be good stewards of your words and works as we move through the arc of our lives in Christian service to our fellow citizens of Earth.
