

Community Interest

This year, 2022 is the 150th Anniversary of the Village of Thorburn. It is an exciting time and an opportunity to share some of the community's important history.

We have formed a committee and are planning to construct a three-part Historical Community Kiosk in the village. The panels will display (1) earliest history with such things as maps, land grants, first settlers, way of life and industries in the very beginning (2) more focused on the early 1900s with type of industry and where people would work; churches, schools, sports and clubs, interesting events, etc. (3) newer history about changes that took place, people who helped make changes, the evolution of our village and the surrounding villages such as Greenwood, MacLellan's Brook, Coalburn and MacLellan's Mountain, all bordering on Thorburn.

Funding for this project is a must and we are presently applying for Government grants, etc.

The Bell



In 1899 the order of service was changed to have the offering taken up and the 21 minutes read before the service, which order is still our custom. The general practice of ringing the bell at 20 minutes and again at 5 minutes to the hour of service was started in 1914. The previous way the use of individual contributions was through the practice. Much earlier—in 1890—the Woman's Christian Temperance Union was pressing for "the discontinuing of the use of insubstantiating notes at the Lord's Table," but some years later have elapsed before our present custom of taking unfermented juice came into being.

The Bell

Not much is known about our church bell, that has been there since the early 1900s. It is mentioned briefly in the Union Presbyterian Church Centennial book on page 28.

1914 – Church Bell is purchased.

In another place that it was mentioned is in an old church bulletin commemorating the church's 90th Anniversary. This tells us when it was the correct time to ring the bell, like a set of instructions.

What is interesting is that this bell was made by the McShane Bell Company, which was at the time, located in Baltimore, Maryland and they have since moved to St. Louis, Missouri. They have no records of this bell being shipped to Thorburn or at least they haven't found any yet.

The bell has inscribed on it:

Union Church

Thorburn

1913

It is seen faintly in the enlarged photo. Besides its beautiful shape and sound, it can use a cleaning. It is wonderful to have the technology to photograph it and share it with you today.

Now that the bell ringing has been revived, we try as much as possible to keep the schedule on Sunday, having the bell ring at 20 minutes to eleven and at 5 minutes to eleven.
